

Present Perfect Continuous Tense: Identification and Definition

- Examples:

- Temporary Nature:
 - Often used for actions or situations that are temporary and expected to end at some point.
- Duration Emphasis:
 - Highlights the duration or ongoing nature of an action.

- Temporal Reference:
 - Links past actions to the present and often implies relevance to the current moment.
- Continuous Aspect:
 - Emphasizes the ongoing nature of the action.
- Duration Emphasis:
 - Stresses the length of time the action has been happening.

"We have been waiting for the bus since morning."
"They have been working on this project for weeks."

- Present Perfect Simple vs. Present Perfect Continuous:

- Present Perfect Continuous emphasizes the ongoing action and its duration, while Present Perfect Simple focuses more on the result or completion of the action.
- Present Continuous vs. Present Perfect Continuous:
 - Present Continuous refers to actions happening now, while Present Perfect Continuous links past actions to the present.
