Practice of Present Perfect Tense with WH-Questions

Introduction:

Notes:

Review of Present Perfect Tense:

- Question: How has he learned to play the guitar? Common Mistakes to Avoid:
 - Ensure correct usage of the auxiliary verb "have" (has/have) based on the subject.
 - Use the past participle form of the main verb after the auxiliary verb.
 - Choose appropriate WH-words according to the information being sought.
