

Formation of Negative, Interrogative, and Interrogative-Negative Sentences in Present Perfect Tense

Negative Sentences:

- To form negative sentences in the present perfect tense, use the present tense of the auxiliary verb "have" (has/have) followed by "not" and the past participle form of the main verb.
- Example: She has not finished her homework yet.
