

Topic: Present Indefinite Tense Practice with WH-Questions

Introduction:

- The present indefinite tense is used to describe actions that happen regularly, repeatedly, or habits.
- WH-questions (who, what, where, when, why, how) are used to gather specific information about actions in the present tense.

Notes:

What is Present Indefinite Tense?

- It is used to express habits, general truths, and facts.
- Form: Subject + Base Verb (+s/es for third person singular) + Object

WH-Questions in Present Indefinite Tense:

- Who: Used to inquire about the subject of the action.
Example: Who plays football every evening?
- What: Used to inquire about the action or activity.
Example: What do they eat for breakfast?
- Where: Used to inquire about the location of the action.
Example: Where does she work?
- When: Used to inquire about the time of the action.
Example: When do they usually go to bed?
- Why: Used to inquire about the reason for the action.
Example: Why do you drink coffee every morning?
- How: Used to inquire about the manner or method of the action.
Example: How does he study for exams?

Practice Exercises:

- Rewrite the following sentences as WH-questions:
She reads novels every night.
• Question: What does she read every night?
They play basketball after school.
• Question: When do they play basketball?
John goes to the gym three times a week.
• Question: How often does John go to the gym?
Sarah eats lunch at noon.
• Question: When does Sarah eat lunch?

Common Mistakes to Avoid:

- Ensure subject-verb agreement, especially for third-person singular subjects.
- Use the correct WH-word according to the information being sought.
